

#### **Notes from the Music Staff**

Normally, I would use this space to talk about what's upcoming for Lent and Easter in the music program, and I probably should do that now. But I feel compelled to speak to something else. As most of you know, on December 15 I had surgery to repair a detached retina.

I would first like to say that I wouldn't recommend this to anyone. After hearing the horror stories of others regarding recovery, I was convinced there was no way I could handle it. Most people have to lie face down for at least a week, if not two, immediately after surgery and then take it very easy for quite a while after. My doctor had told me it would probably be a week. UGH! The surgery itself was a unique experience for me. anesthetist told me I would be sedated but not "put under" during the surgery. So when they wheeled me in, there I was, in my mind WIDE AWAKE as they started going to town on my eye! I could hear every word that the doctors and nurses spoke. I could tell who was who by where their voices were coming from. It was a scary experience. Not particularly painful, but scary. When I was done, the anesthetist was the one who wheeled me into recovery. As we headed that way, I said "Can I ask you a question?" She said sure. I said "Can you please tell me why I needed to be awake for that?" She said there was no need to take the risk of putting me out. I said "Just for my two cents, I would take the risk rather than listen." Anyway, one of my reasons for writing this is to tell you that God only gives you what you can handle. My doctor told me in my next day visit that I only had to lie face down and flat for 3 days and that I could take a break 15 minutes of every hour. I was so relieved! But I can tell you that I barely made that! Thanks to God and my doctors, I came through it.

However, there was another factor at work, which brings me to the other reason for this writing. I am so grateful for all the thoughts and prayers from folks here at St. Paul. I can't tell you how many people have asked about me and told me they were praying for me! Prayer is such a powerful tool.



Even now as I head toward what I hope to be a full recovery, I am still immersed in the bubble of thoughts and prayers you all have given. I can never begin to thank you enough, but I felt it necessary to use this space to make sure you knew how much it has meant

to me. THANK YOU!

Finally, I can't move on without thanking our staff for picking up the slack without me. Thanks to Carmen and Linda for doing a great job of getting us through Christmas Eve. The last time I didn't participate in a Christmas Eve service was 1980! It was painful, but I was reassured that these two ladies stepped up and made it happen!

I do need to spend just a short time talking about what's to come musically in the next few months.

- The Consistory elected the following officers: Tony Mayer, President Angela Most, Vice President Rich Kurtz, Treasurer Ryan Bulman, Secretary



My name is Ava Scherle. I am the daughter of Alaina and Josh Scherle. I am a sophomore at Waterloo High School and a member of St. Paul UCC. I have been involved in the Girl Scout organization for eleven years. I am in Troop 576, which is led by Teresa Bushong and Cara Kettler.
