

Amen STL

The Amen STL mission is open to **ALL** (5 years and older)! It will take place from the afternoon of Wednesday, June 5 through Saturday, June 8. During our time in St. Louis, we'll have the opportunity to work with multiple service organizations, such as Isaiah 58 Ministries, New Roots Urban Farm and the STL Food Bank.

Overnight Option

The cost for staying overnight at the Amen STL house is \$50 per night (\$150 total) for the half-week.

Service Project Only Option

While participants are able to spend the nights at the Amen STL house, those desiring to participate solely in the mission projects each day are invited to do so. The church bus will depart each morning from Waterloo and return each evening for those electing to participate in this way.

Henderson Settlement

A group of youth (high school age) and adults will be serving at the Henderson Settlement from Sunday, June 16 through Saturday, June 22. During our time in Henderson, our group will be working alongside a delegation to install flooring, paint ceilings and walls, build a ramp, install vinyl siding and more for impoverished members of the Henderson community.

Notes from the Music Staff

As I write this, I am looking out the window in my office at the wonders of spring—bright sunshine, birds singing, grass growing, flowers blooming and all the trees beginning to green up. It reminds me how lucky we are to live in a world that God provided for us, one of beauty and majesty.



As I describe these things, I'm confident that I am painting a picture in your mind. Even if you look out at a storm or an insanely hot day, these words make a difference in your perception.

I say this because I want to make you aware how powerful words, and more importantly music, can be. The next time you watch a TV show, whether it be a drama series, reality show or even a soap opera, take a minute to listen carefully to what's going on in the background. Almost always there is music, which is helping to set the stage for what's being conveyed by the words and actions on the screen. It could be "FBI" as they close in on a criminal; it could be on "Grey's Anatomy," where the patient's heart stops. It could be on "Chicago Fire" as the firefighters enter a burning building to rescue someone. It could even be on "The Blacklist" as Raymond Reddington finally meets his maker. Music magnifies whatever emotion is being portrayed. Most often you don't even notice, but it's there. When Jeff Probst snuffs out the torch of a survivor contestant, it's there. When Julie Chen says to the big brother contestant, "You have been eliminated," it's there.

What does this have to do with anything? Well, it radiates into the church world as well. Do you

sometimes wonder why we pick the hymns we do? It's because they help to illustrate the theme being discussed that particular day. If you look in the back of our hymnal, you will find songs listed by topic. These songs, written over the centuries by folks from

all walks of life, help to put us in the space to listen to what God has to say to us. We ask you to sing along so those thoughts permeate your inner self. When the Chancel Choir sings "Joyful, Joyful," it is done to help you understand why we are joyful. When the choir sings "Were You There," it is somber to help illustrate the sadness of that time. When they sing "Silent Night," it is to quietly celebrate the birth of Jesus and that time long ago in that stable.

There are also times when there are no words, just music. This can still be a very powerful tool that conveys emotion, such as with "Rhapsody in Blue" by Gershwin. Not a word is spoken, yet we as listeners have no choice but to be taken through the emotions the composer intended. When the Glenn Miller Orchestra plays "In the Mood," even though words exist, we don't think of the words, we think of the music.

As we move into spring and summer, I urge you to spend some time listening. See if what I am saying makes any sense. (It does to me!) Take time to smell the flowers, as the wise man said. Remember that words paint a picture, but music makes that picture a work of art! Thank God for each day and for the wonderful gift he has given us!

June's mission has been designated for Uni-Pres Kindercottage.

Kindercottage is a joint mission of the United Church of Christ and the Presbyterian Church, and it provides

daycare and preschool for low income families in East St. Louis. Kindercottage's mission is to provide an environment in which all ages—infants through adults have opportunities for growth and enrichment through educational and social programs, developed in а community setting, resulting in healthy and stable families. Your donations to Kindercottage will help support the economic and social wellbeing of children, families and their community.



July's mission is Child's World Preschool. Child's World Preschool started in 1979 to provide quality early childhood education to young children in our community. Forty-five years later we continue to provide that quality education, not just in our community but also to families in the surrounding communities. Sometimes we have families who love the quality education we provide but have difficulty

affording the cost. Families who have utilized our scholarship program within the last few years have been grateful for having the opportunity to have their child attend our preschool. Besides funding our scholarship, the need for new curriculum, materials and toys has been increasing due to the ever-changing needs of our students. We are currently looking into a new socialemotional curriculum to utilize in our classrooms for next year. Your monetary donations will help offset the cost of some of those improvements as well. We will also have classroom items that we could use. Those items will be posted on our bulletin in the administrative board entryway during the month of July.

As always, we thank you, St. Paul, for your continued support of Child's World Preschool – where learning, working and playing is how our students become kindergarten ready.

Consistory Report—1st Quarter Review Tony Mayer, President

The year started with five new members coming onto the Consistory: Gayle North, Angela Most, Kary Eckrich, Amanda Chase and Ian Scherle.

With the absence of a pastor, staff has found pulpit supply as well as pastoral care for the year. The staff has gone above and beyond in getting the everyday jobs accomplished.

Consistory approved the Renovation Committee's recommendation for the updating of the Fellowship Hall bathrooms, as well as our entryway upgrade including new carpeting and painting. An April 7th congregational meeting approved the renovations.

Also during the first quarter, the Consistory approved:

- Anna Bulman's hiring as a nursery attendant.
- A telephone system upgrade to replace the current system in place since 2002.
- New windows to replace original wooden windows on the rental property at 211 N. Market.

The renovation will begin May 6 in the Fellowship Hall. The current plan is to begin the work upstairs after the renovation in the Fellowship Hall is complete. Every effort will be made to minimize or disruptions to daily activities. Thank you for your patience.
